### Mini Fete News

The TRBPS annual Mini Fete was held on Wednesday. It was a wonderful day and enjoyed by all members of the school community. The children spent Tuesday afternoon 'spruiking' their stalls and did a great job of enticing the community to visit their various stalls which included plants, toys, books, sporting goods, cakes, sausages, gelato and other delicious treats!

All classes have been very busy organising their displays and merchandise to sell over the past few weeks. Thank you to all of the TRBPS staff and students who prepared some very exciting stalls for the mini fete or provided assistance with counting money or showing guests around. Overall it was a great success and we really enjoyed walking around to chat with many parents, carers and students who were managing their stalls or just simply enjoying what the mini fete had to offer. It was definitely an exciting afternoon for everyone involved and what a fantastic way to raise money to support some of our school programs and activities. The Year 6 Students did a fantastic job in running their own stalls and this year worked hard to ensure that what they sold had minimal impact on the environment. Each group developed a waste management plan and chose materials that could easily be recycled. This was evident with the use of paper plates/paper cups instead of plastic and also with stalls that provided entertainment such as down ball rather than actually selling a physical item. Our school has had a strong focus this year on sustainability with the prep classes potting plants and making beeswax wrappers. It was wonderful to see students thinking about the environment when creating their stalls.

Thank you to everyone in the school community and wider who donated merchandise or made goods to sell. We couldn't have implemented this event without all of your kind support. We raised approx. \$ after expenses. This is another example of the fantastic TRBPS community effort!

### November Curriculum Day

The focus of the first half of the curriculum day was unpacking NAPLAN Reading and Writing data. This part of the day was run by Emma Baldwin and our Literacy Learning Specialist Cyndi Wiltshire. As it is the first time our school has participated in the NAPLAN online assessment it was important that staff have an understanding of how the online test questions differ from that of the paper based test. Staff were able to see areas of reading that students at TRBPS did well and areas where more work is needed. Time was allocated so staff could work together to use this data to forward plan and ensure their teaching is targeted towards developing student knowledge and understanding particularly in the area of comprehension. Cyndi and Emma also took staff through NAPLAN writing data. With the use of this data and the NAPLAN writing guide, staff were able to work in teams to forward plan with a goal of targeting areas where students had not scored highly. The plans were saved on the google drive and utilising this drive meant that all staff could actively type their ideas directly onto the plan and that these will be readily accessible for them to also access during planning sessions.

The last part of the day was led by Debbie Walters and Robyn Farnell and they took staff through the DET 'AMPLIFY' Document which supports teachers to incorporate 'Student Voice and Agency and Leadership' (SVAL) into their classroom program planning.

This will be a big focus for TRBPS next year as Student Voice, Agency and Leadership forms one of our School Strategic Plan Goals (SSP) and this goal will be open in our Annual Implementation Plan 2020 (AIP) for us to incorporate more fully into our teaching practice for improved student learning. The aim of the session was to provide staff with a clear understanding of what Student Voice, Agency and Leadership and to develop a clear understanding of each element, as we have found as an education system that they mean different things to different teachers. The idea was to work on developing consistent understanding of each element of SVAL across our school, and to take the time to unpack the definitions given in AMPLIFY. We worked on looking at how we can begin to incorporate the 3 elements through suggested AMPLIFY strategies. We also generated ideas in level teams of how each strategy could be used to enhance our current curriculum program planning, as well as to create and promote effective learning partnerships with students.

### **Staffing Update for 2020**

Due to lower student enrolment numbers for 2020 our current contract teachers, Christine Turnock, Isobel Turner and Elly Wood will be moving on to other primary schools. We are very excited and celebrate the fact that all three of them have picked up provisional positions. We would like to thank them for the contribution they have made to TRBPS.

Congratulations to Brett Dempster who was successful in obtaining the provisional classroom teaching position with IT responsibilities at TRBPS. We would also like to make the community aware that Miia Karvinen will be taking leave next year too. We are also still in the process of advertising the Italian teaching position and hope to have this filled by the end of the year.

The grade levels that current staff will be teaching in 2020 are still being finalised and will be announced to the community in the coming weeks.

### **School Council Data Share**

At the October meeting NAPLAN Data as well as data from the Attitudes to School Survey, Staff Survey and the Parent Opinion Survey were shared with all members. It was a great opportunity to celebrate the success of our school's NAPLAN results. We have achieved many of our Annual Implementation Plan NAPLAN targets including increasing the percentage of Students in Year 5 in the top 2 bands of Writing and Numeracy.

Council members were then able to look closely at the survey data and worked in small groups to record what they felt was positive, challenging and unexpected about all the data. It was a very productive meeting and providing time for our school council members to analyse the data was a very valuable exercise. We thank all our members for their contribution on the night.

### **Bayside Peninsula Area Principal Forum**

Attending this forum last Thursday was highly valuable as one of the sessions was around the new ministerial order on **Mobile Phones**. As you may have read in previous newsletters and also seen in the media, mobile phones will be banned at all Victorian state primary and secondary schools from Term 1 2020. As a result of this every school in Victoria now has access to the newly created Department of Education and Training (DET) *Student Mobiles in Schools Policy* to provide guidelines and policy around the use of mobile phones in schools. We are able to tailor some aspects to the individual school context. At present, we are going through this process of contextualising the DET policy and we will be able to share the TRBPS Mobile Phone Policy 2020 with the school community before the end of the year.

A timely reminder that under our current policy, students who bring mobile phones to school need to ensure they are turned off and are kept in bags during school time or handed to the classroom teacher for safe keeping during school hours.

### **A note from the School Council President**

Dear Parents, Carers and School Community members,

I can hardly believe that the end of the school year is just next month and that my first year in this role has nearly come to an end. What a super busy year it has been for our school community! With so many things always happening, I thought I would reflect on some key highlights from my perspective:

- The new gymnasium has been integrated into the life of the school, being used for whole school assemblies, school and community sport, and other events. Those of you who remember the freezing cold or boiling hot assemblies held on the bitumen will appreciate the gym as much as I do!
- The work over the last five years of creating a consistent approach to teaching across the year levels at Tucker Rd is really starting to pay off. Students can now expect teachers to use the same methodologies, language and approaches as they move into a new year level, which makes it easier for students to learn and apply their skills in the key areas of writing, reading and numeracy. Evidence of this can be seen in the recent NAPLAN results for our Grade 5s where there was a significant uplift in writing skills since Grade 3 compared to their peer cohort across the state. We also saw a significant reduction in the number of students at the lower end of the numeracy results which means those students have achieved an outstanding rate of growth.
- A particular highlight for me was the school concert as it is rare to have the whole school community together at the one time. The concert provided a wonderful opportunity for all students to stand on a professional stage, sing, dance or act and participate in the joy of the performing arts. I am very grateful for the care and enthusiasm the teachers put into ensuring the concert is well-run and enjoyable for all.

We should all be proud of the fact that Tucker Rd is a school that provides a wide range of opportunities for students to explore their passions - whether it be music, chess, sports, reading or in the tech shed. A lot of parents are surprised to know that the yearly Government funding for schools only covers teacher and staff salaries. If we want to upgrade IT equipment, buy new and exciting books for the library or maintain the playgrounds, the funding for this comes from the yearly parent contributions. So, as we look ahead to the new school year its a good time to reflect on the very important role our parent financial contributions make to ensuring Tucker Rd continues to be an engaging place to learn for all our children!

## FIRST AID NEWS

### Important steps to ensure students are sun smart and safe at school:

UV radiation is at its highest from mid-August to April and peaks during school hours. Please encourage and support your child to develop independent sun protection skills. ( eg hats, sunscreen ,clothing )

Also have access and drink plenty of water.

Asthma and hay fever symptoms increase every year between October and December. There is also the chance of an epidemic thunderstorm asthma event during grass pollen season.

Increased risk of thunderstorm asthma can occur in people with:

- asthma
- a past history of asthma
- undiagnosed asthma
- hay fever, who may not have asthma
- poor control and self-management of asthma.

### Protect yourself this pollen season – Managing asthma and allergies matters

Grass pollen season brings an increase in asthma and hay fever. It also brings the chance of thunderstorm asthma. For people with asthma or hay fever, especially those who experience wheezing or coughing with their hay fever, thunderstorm asthma can be sudden, serious and even life threatening.

As grass pollen season approaches, here are some things you can do to prepare for pollen season:

- **If you've ever had asthma** – talk to your doctor about what you can do to help protect yourself from the risk of thunderstorm asthma this pollen season. Remember taking an asthma preventer properly and regularly is key to preventing asthma, including thunderstorm asthma.
- **If you have hay fever** – see your pharmacist or doctor for a hay fever treatment plan and check if you should have an asthma reliever puffer – which is available from a pharmacy without a prescription.
- **If you have hay fever, and especially if you experience wheezing and coughing with your hay fever**, it is important to make sure you don't also have asthma. Speak to your doctor today about whether or not you might have asthma.
- It's important for everyone in the community to know the **four steps of asthma first aid** so they know what to do if they or someone is having an asthma attack.
- And finally, **where possible avoid being outside during thunderstorms** from October through December – especially in the wind gusts that come before the storm. Go inside and close your doors and windows. If you have your air conditioning on, turn it onto recirculate.

## 4 STEPS OF ASTHMA FIRST AID

- 1 Sit the person upright
- 2 Give 4 separate puffs of blue/grey reliever puffer  
– Shake puffer  
– Put 1 puff into spacer  
– Take 4 breaths from spacer  
Repeat until 4 puffs have been taken  
Remember: **shake, 1 puff, 4 breaths**  
OR give 2 separate doses of a Bricanyl inhaler (age 6 & over) or a Symbicort inhaler (over 12)
- 3 Wait 4 minutes  
If there is no improvement, give 4 more separate puffs of blue/grey reliever as above  
OR give 1 more dose of Bricanyl or Symbicort inhaler
- 4 If there is still no improvement dial Triple Zero (000) for an ambulance  
Keep giving 4 separate puffs every 4 minutes until emergency assistance arrives  
OR 1 dose of Bricanyl or Symbicort every 4 minutes – up to 3 more doses of Symbicort

Call emergency assistance immediately. Dial Triple Zero (000):

- If the person is not breathing.
- If the person's asthma suddenly becomes worse, or is not improving.
- If the person is having an asthma attack and a reliever is not available.
- If you are not sure if it's asthma.
- If the person is known to have anaphylaxis – follow their Anaphylaxis Action Plan, then give Asthma First Aid. Blue/grey reliever medication is unlikely to harm, even if the person does not have asthma.


